Rowing Canada Aviron (RCA) and **Maple Bay Rowing Club** are looking forward to welcoming athletes, coaches, umpires and supporters to Quamichan Lake in the Cowichan Valley – the traditional ancestral territories of Coast Salish First Nations and the home of the National Training Centre (NTC) and site of the 2023 RCA National Rowing Championships.

This year's RCA National Rowing Championships (NRCs) event will be held from Thursday, September 28 through to Sunday, October 1, 2023. This includes an Athlete Awards Dinner on Saturday evening and an additional day scheduled for inclement weather.

ID Requirements: All athletes must have a Government issued ID for weigh-ins and dock access during racing. You may present a photo of your ID, but it must be government issued and clearly shows your picture and date of birth (i.e. passport, driver's license, etc).

NATIONAL DAY FOR TRUTH AND RECONCILIATION

Saturday, September 30 is the **National Day for Truth and Reconciliation**, also known as "Orange Shirt Day".

In June 2021, the Government of Canada made September 30 a federal statutory holiday, "the day honours the children who never returned home and Survivors of residential schools, as well as their families and communities. Public commemoration of the tragic and painful history and ongoing impacts of residential schools is a vital component of the reconciliation process."

In 2013, the St. Joseph Mission Residential School Commemoration Project and Reunion took place in Williams Lake, BC, which led to the creation of "Orange Shirt Day". Phyllis Webstad was the spokesperson for the Reunion group and told the story of her first day at residential school, when the orange shirt her grandmother bought for her was taken from upon arrival. We now recognize that many more atrocities took place at residential schools across Canada, with many children never returning home to their families.

"The date was chosen because it is the time of year in which children were taken from their homes to residential schools, and because it is an opportunity to set the stage for anti-racism and anti-bullying policies for the coming school year. It is an opportunity for First Nations, local governments, schools communities to come together in the spirit of reconciliation and hope for generations of children to come."

We encourage you to learn more about the legacy of residential schools and the treatment of First Nations, Metis, and Inuit peoples in the country known as Canada.

REGATTA SCHEDULE AND TIME TRIAL DRAW

The provisional schedule will be available on RegattaCentral in the evening on Monday, September 25. The start list for the Time Trials will be available in the afternoon of Wednesday, September 27.

The OC is aiming to minimize waste and protect the environment, and so where possible, will operate in a 'paperless' environment. Limited hard copies of schedules and results will be posted on the results and notice board. Please bookmark the **RegattaCentral website** on your phone.

ON-WATER SAFETY

The OC has arranged for safety boats to be on water for all training and racing sessions.

Notes:

- **a. PARA ATHLETES:** Para athletes may require additional rescue/safety services during training. Para coaches/athletes please contact the OC in the Regatta Office to ensure adequate coverage is arranged.
- **b. PRE-TRAINING:** Training is possible on Quamichan if you arrive early under strict conditions. All visitors must sign out a coach boat and provide a coach to go out on the water with your crews.

Note: Safety is your own responsibility during this period. The OC will not be monitoring the water until Wednesday, September 27 at 12:00PM PT. Email Jon Rose (jrose@rowingcanada.org) to arrange a boat.

TRAFFIC PATTERNS

Updated maps of the traffic patterns for training, Time Trials, and 2000m racing will be loaded on RegattaCentral and also displayed at the venue.

Local crews, please note the changes to regular club rowing traffic patterns. Athletes and coaches should carefully review the maps before arrival.

Infringements of the traffic pattern(s) may incur an official warning, yellow card, or red card (exclusion from the event).

CREW DEADLINES / SCRATCH DEADLINES

As per RCA Rule 7.6, crew changes after the close of entries and before the first heat may be made in writing at the Regatta Office (in Duncan Lodge located upstairs), up to 1 hour before the first heat of the event (other than medical substitutions). See Rule 7.7 for rules related to changes after the first heat. A fee of \$50 will be charged for each scratching and 'no show' crews.

Note: Medical substitutions require a medical certificate to be lodged with the regatta office in order to waive the scratching fee.

International / Canadian composite crews:

Several Canadian athletes nominating for National selection but studying in the USA have been allowed to race a pair with an international pair partner (also studying at the same university/club). These composite crews will not be eligible for a Canadian National Rowing Championship medal, and the next ranked Canadian crew will be elevated on the final medal table. The international athlete will not be eligible for Canadian National selection.

ATHLETE INFORMATION

CONTROL COMMISSION

The Control Commission will be open during racing hours only. All boats must access the launch pontoon and water via the Control Commission checkpoint, where officials will check various safety requirements (including legal bow balls, quick release footstretchers, heel ties, athletes ID, etc.).

ID REQUIREMENTS

Please note that photo ID is mandatory for athlete weigh-ins and dock access during racing. Acceptable ID will be any government issued document with a photo and date of birth - This can be a passport, driver's licence, provincial ID card, or provincial health card (provided it has a picture). If an athlete does not have any of these, the Chief Umpire has confirmed the use of a high school ID with picture in combination with a birth certificate will be accepted.

Photos of ID on electronic devices or a clear photocopy of a passport will be acceptable.

LIGHTWEIGHT WEIGH-IN

For NRC regatta lightweight events, no lightweight rower may weigh more than 72.5kgs (men) or 59kg (women). A test scale will be available in the weigh-in tent starting at 12:00pm on Wednesday, September 27, 2022. Lightweight rowers shall be weighed wearing their racing uniform on tested scales not less than one hour and not more than two hours before their first race of each lightweight event in which they are competing, each day of the competition. Weigh-ins will take place in a designated area, the covered structure adjacent to the Lodge building (see site map for details).

MEDALS

Medals will be awarded to first, second and third placed athletes and crews in the 'A' Final of each event. All awards will be presented after the completion of all 'A' finals, on land near the boating area.

All Gold medallists will also receive a pair of Oakley sunglasses.

PROVINCIAL POINTS SYSTEM (NRCs)

Points Distribution for events with more than 10 entries:

Points will be awarded to the top 10 placing crews on a sliding scale. Points will only be awarded to athletes representing their provincial team.

Points for composite pairs to be split equally to the provinces making the entry.

Points Distribution for events with less than 10 entries:

In events with less than 10 competitors, the points will be awarded from the "bottom up" vs the "top down". Points are awarded based on an athlete's placing and distributed relative to the overall depth of an event. For example, if there were 8 competitors, the winning boat would earn 7 points for their province, second place 6 points, third place 5 points, and so forth.

Case of Athlete Winning Their Own Restricted Event and Open Category Event:

An athlete can earn points only in the event in which they are entered. For example, if entered the BW1x and win the W1x, then points are awarded only for the BW1x event.

If an athlete/crew wins an event above their entered category, then the second place finisher in the event earns 9 points and the third place finisher earns 8 points and so on down.

Provincial Awards:

- The Grand Champion Award Shall be deemed the province with the greatest number of points.
- The Efficiency Award Is tabulated by dividing number of points earned by a province by the number of athletes
 the province registered for the regatta.

ANTI-DOPING

All competitors are advised that doping control may be in effect, and that all competitors are subject to doping control under the Canadian Anti-Doping Program (CADP). Coaches and other athlete support personnel are also subject to the rules of the CADP. Athletes are strongly encouraged to visit http://www.cces.ca/athletezone for helpful information and resources; to know their rights and responsibilities as athletes with regards to anti-doping; to understand the sample collection procedures; to check all medications and products before taking them to ensure they do not contain banned substances; to avoid taking supplements (but if they choose to, learn how to minimize their risk); to verify medical exemption requirements; and contact the CCES directly should they have any questions or would like additional information (call 1-800-672-7775 or email info@cces.ca).

Athletes who test positive risk being sanctioned in accordance with the rules of the CADP. Athletes are responsible for reviewing this information prior to competition.
